Using Prefixes, Suffixes, and Roots

You can figure out the meanings of new words by using the three word parts: prefixes, suffixes, and roots. Before you can do this, however, you must become familiar with a number of common word parts.

Prefixes

Prefixes are those "word parts" that come *before* the root word. (*Pre*- means "before.") Prefixes often change the intent or meaning of the root word.
